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- 1. What sort of knowledge do we have of space, according to Kant? Is he right?
- 2. In the Second Analogy, Kant argues that we must apply the category of causality in experience. Explain and evaluate his argument.
- 3. In what sense, if any, can phenomena in space be real, even if space is ideal? Discuss Kant's answer.
- 4. EITHER: (a) Is Kant a compatibilist or an incompatibilist or neither?
 - **OR:** (b) 'Through this I, or He, or It (the thing), which thinks, nothing further is represented than a transcendental subject of the thoughts = X.' (KANT) Explain and discuss.
- 5. 'Dialectic ... [is] the grasping of opposites in their unity or of the positive in the negative.' (HEGEL) Discuss.
- 6. Is Hegel's discussion of sense certainty in the *Phenomenology* a critique of empiricism?
- 7. What is the strongest objection against Hegel's account of recognition? Does it succeed?
- 8. Is Hegel's theory of liberty best read as liberal or illiberal?
- 9. Is Nietzsche's philosophical method in the *Genealogy of Morality* philosophically productive?
- 10. Are any of Nietzsche's critiques of Christian morality persuasive?
- 11. What, if anything, can the *Birth of Tragedy* tell us about the nature and function of art?
- 12. 'We do not consider the falsity of a judgment as itself an objection to a judgment.' (NIETZSCHE) Explain and discuss.
