# **SECTION A**

- 1 Is Meno's paradox a serious philosophical problem or merely a trite sophism?
- 2 Critically discuss Socrates' argument for **one** of the following claims:
  - (a) no one desires bad things (77–78);
  - (b) virtue is knowledge (87–89).
- 3 How successfully does Socrates distinguish knowledge from true belief in the *Meno*, and why does he introduce the distinction into the dialogue?
- 4 'The whole of searching and knowing is recollection.' Does Socrates provide a successful defence of this claim in the *Meno*?

#### **SECTION B**

- Why is the existence of evil a problem for Cleanthes? Does he deal with it adequately?
- Expound and evaluate the strongest criticism of the argument from design that can be found in Hume's *Dialogues Concerning Natural Religion*.
- 7 '... the question can never be concerning the *being*, but only the *nature* of the Deity' (PHILO, *Dialogues Concerning Natural Religion*). Discuss.
- 8 'So dangerous it is to introduce this idea of necessity into the present question! And so naturally does it afford an inference directly opposite to the religious hypothesis!' (PHILO, *Dialogues Concerning Natural Religion*). Discuss.

#### **SECTION C**

- 9 Does Mill succeed in making a clear, persuasive distinction between self-regarding and other-regarding actions?
- Are there any circumstances in which the government would be justified in forcing individuals 'for their own good' to do something they did not wish to do?
- 11 Is utilitarianism compatible with liberty?
- Why, according to Mill, should a society encourage a plurality of lifestyles? Is Mill right?
