- 1. Do philosophers disagree with one another about the nature of aesthetic experience, or are they simply talking past one another?
- 2. Can there be faultless aesthetic disagreement?
- 3. 'A perfect forgery is of equal artistic worth to the original.' Discuss.
- 4. 'There are no immoral books. A book is either well-written or badly-written.' Discuss.
- 5. EITHER (a) 'Defining "art" is no more difficult than any other philosophical project of definition.' Discuss.
 - OR (b) Is it possible to create an artwork that is completely unlike any preceding artwork?
- 6. Are musical works abstract objects? Would your answer be different for other kinds of artwork?
