- 1 What is Kant's argument for the synthetic apriority of geometry, and is it sound?
- 2 'The phenomenon-noumenon distinction does not entail the existence of two distinct worlds of objects.' Discuss.
- 3 'The Transcendental Deduction is refuted by the possibility of intuitions without concepts.' Discuss.
- 4 'Free will is compatible with determinism only if transcendental idealism is true.' Discuss.
- 5 Does Hegel have a philosophically defensible concept of 'Spirit'?
- 6 **Either** (a) What is the significance of Hegel's claim that there can be no 'method' in philosophy? Is he right?
 - **Or** (b) Is Hegel correct to think that philosophical statements are essentially different from the statements we make in ordinary life?
- 7 Does Hegel have a telling criticism of empiricism?
- 8 Is Hegel right to think that under appropriate circumstances philosophical argumentation will result in convergence to a single set of views?
- 9 Is tragedy a stimulant to life of the kind Nietzsche thinks it is?
- 10 Does Nietzsche 's account of art in *The Birth of Tragedy* yield a normative aesthetics?
- 11 Does Nietzsche convincingly show that a critique of modern morality should take the form of a historical account?
- 12 What does Nietzsche mean by his claim that the desire for truth at all costs is fundamentally moral? Is he right?
